I knew of a small boy who was sitting in time-out in his room so that he might contemplate some inappropriate behavior. His mother concerned by his silence went to check on him and finding him on his knees, was touched. "Are you praying to Jesus to make you behave?" she asked. "NO!" he replied. "I am praying to make *you* go away!"

We have all wanted to bend the rules or ignore a posted warning. Spare us a Jiminy Cricket on our shoulders. Accountability can cramp our style but there is little honor without it, little safety as well.

Josh McDowell tells a story of a young man who crept out in the middle of the night and walked onto a neighbor's property. He ignored the sign on a tall fence that indicated it was private property and trespassing was not allowed. He climbed over. Once inside, he proceeded to cannonball off the diving board for a midnight swim to tragically discover there was only one foot of water in the pool.

The wisdom of the scriptures and the guidance we are given in prayer are there not to kill the good times but to provision them. The "shalts and shalt nots" are there to protect us from the empty pools of life but also to lay up blessings that cannot be stolen. Everything God does is to lead us towards that final, "Well done, Thou good and faithful. Enter in!" His promises are backed, not by the changeableness of things in this life, but by His own immutable character.

Tonight in chapel almost every seat was taken. Many of the people there are new to us and some do not like rules of any kind. They may make a grudging acknowledgement of the safety in those rules but they have yet to recognize their provision. God seems to them to be an inconvenience they must suffer if they want a bed. Our guests have yet to experience the blessings that have only begun to settle into the hollow places in their lives just by walking through the doors of the Mission, but it is coming.

A volunteer told me a story recently. The volunteer was in the front hallway when an unkempt man walked to the Mission door and back out into the parking lot three times. The man was undecided about this place. A staff member left his desk and opening the door said, "Hey, you're in the right place. Come on in. Welcome to the Mission." It may have been his first welcome in a long time.

We covet your prayers for this season and for this opportunity to share the beauty of Christ with people little accustomed to beauty of any kind. Beauty with rules that allow for a healthy life in community. We are on a mission to illuminate God's protection and provision and His wonderful, dependable, trustworthy promises.



May we all face Him with hearts of worship, in thanksgiving for His loving-kindness. May His mercy unlock every heart and every opportunity for us all. We are in the right place.

Thank you, Voice of Praise choir and Director, Holly Lee, for your recent performance at the Mission. This group traveled to Anchorage from the lower 48 to minister.




