When we were young marrieds school tuition took a sizable bite out of our finances. Kathy, in fact, would not buy the new coat she needed to fend off the severe northeast Ohio winter because a coat would cost what three credit hours would cost. To help us stick to a budget, we made a rule that neither of us would spend more than fifty dollars without the other one agreeing to the necessity of it. It worked.

One day while she was searching in my tool shed for a picture hook, she discovered a jar with change and loose bills. Her heart swelled because she knew she had discovered my secret coat fund. She also determined to help me reach my goal on the sly. For weeks she skipped lunch at work and put the money she saved in the jar. If she filled the car or got groceries, the change went toward swelling the secret coat fund. She was delighted even as she denied herself one thing after another and we got cheaper and cheaper cuts of meat for dinner, but the jar was almost full and she knew any day I would reveal it was coat buying time.

One frigid January day she came in from work to discover a record album set of the complete works of Gustav Mahler and two other albums as well. As someone who had trolled record stores with me, she was well aware of the cost of what was sitting there. She reminded me in her best head nurse voice that we had an agreement not to take more than fifty dollars out of our budget without both of us agreeing to it. "What is the meaning of all these albums, John? Can you return them?"

It was then that I let her know I had been saving for them in a jar on my tool bench and that I must have been a better saver than I imagined because there was so much more in the jar than I thought. The silence

was deafening and the look on her face was one I will never forget. Those were followed by the admission that she had been putting the money in the wrong jar instead of a jar of her own, that she had gotten it all wrong and thought she was getting ahead by padding my stash. Kathy had gotten it wrong but I was the one who felt like a cheapskate. She had made an error but my wife still was without the coat she needed.

Early love is learning love and we learned something that day. We learned not to keep secrets. We learned to prioritize. (A coat over a record should have been a no brainer.) We learned you can't assume your money is going where it should be if you don't pray about it. We learned to be more mindful about the way we did things even before "mindfulness" was a topic that hit the New York Times best seller list.

How often I hear stories with sad endings because somebody was not careful how they walked through life, how they walked through other people's lives, selfishness replacing generosity, assuming one thing when it was another. The scriptures urge us toward the ancient paths, to ask where the best roads are then to walk in them that we may have peace. The steps of God's good people are ordered and walking out that order, especially where other people are involved requires sensitivity, discipline and God-direction. It also requires the same things when walking out our life in Christ. The Lord may have very different plans for the contents of the jar He is filling for us than we do. Ancient path. Mind our steps. Mind of Christ.




