

Finding Our Way to the Glory Side

Why do you see the speck that is in your brother's eye, but do not notice the log that is in your own eye? -Matthew 7:3 ESV

We have all heard the old saying that points out that we find our own faults in others. The very things that drive us to distraction in someone are almost always our own unacknowledged failings of behavior or character. We seem to identify that pattern in everyone else in our orbit but not ourselves.

I recall complaining once about another driver's bad road habits only to have everyone in the car I was driving at that moment give me the horse laugh. Who *me* wait until the last moment to brake? I am sure I *never* miss my exit. When have you seen me pass up a dozen good parking spaces while looking for the perfect parking space? You get the idea. My audience was unsparing. I just didn't see it. Sometimes I still don't.

It is one thing to not "get it" in small things. It is another to miss the self-awareness that allows us to move through life without hindering the message of Christ in both the lives of believers and those yet to respond to the Savior's call.

Christ comes into our lives and the Father views our lives through the perfection of His Son. We are no longer living under the penalty of our sinful past, but we are far from being perfected. That is a daily work of the Holy Spirit in agreement with us throughout our lifetime. We are, all of us, a work in progress and we are going to be challenged by the flaws of this world and all the folks in it. It can still be so easy to see things from only our perspective.

A book I am reading makes this point by telling a story about a man who is standing on one side of a fast-flowing river. A woman approaches the bank across the river from him and calls out to him

asking where she might safely cross over to the other side. He calls back in answer to her question only to point out to her that she was already standing on the "other side of the river." Any side but his side was the other side.

I love how Jesus was willing to engage people who had different ideas without making them feel less. Even the woman at the well experienced courtesy and interest. She had to feel like Christ really saw her and not just to point out her sins but to share with her the promise of the ages and to bring her alongside. It is the nature of Christ working through our lives that can rub elbows with our neighbors in ways that are Kingdom coming.

The scripture tells us that the person who is forgiven much loves much. By that standard we all should be famous lovers of others, easily entreated, eager to help, slow to judge. If we can learn this lesson then we can model it for the rest of the world or at least our families, friends and those we work with.

Here on Tudor Road we are praying for surrendered lives- ours and our dear clients. Those surrendered lives will cause walls to fall and will lead us to discover that safe place to cross the river so we may all find our way, not to the *other* side, but to the *glory* side.

In a month famous for love, let's all love much in honor of the One who first loved us and gave Himself for us.
