A Pot-belly Encouragement

Sell your possessions and give to the poor. Provide purses for yourselves that will not wear out, a treasure in heaven that will never fail, where no thief comes near and no moth destroys. ~ Luke 12:33 NIV

I had been in Amarillo for a month working at the church but my family was still in Dallas waiting for school to be out in six months before joining me. There were times when I was desperately lonely. One day a box was waiting for me on my desk. When I opened it, an old pot-belly bear stared back at me. This treasure from my son's childhood had survived the many purges of growing up. I had a teenage son who would not part with that bear for money and did not care if his buddies knew it. The note said the bear was being sent to keep me company and to remind me that I was loved. My son still has that bear and I have a precious memory.

Generosity, as it is used in several places in the New Testament, is a different sort of word and does not mean what you would expect. It refers to folding something with simplicity so there are no hidden or secret pockets or double folds. It is kindness that is transparent, not opaque, without a hidden agenda- love in its "simple-fold" form.

Throughout the years I have been the recipient of tremendous kindness. I have a wife whose generosity towards me has been unrestrained for fifty years. I have a son who supported and encouraged me at some crucial times. I have a grandson who opened his little treasure box and said, "Grandpa, these are my favorite things and you can pick one to keep." I have friends who have forgiven my mistakes and a Savior who paid off my debts. It is impossible for me to look at someone in need now and not offer them the same robe that has been woven for me by so many hands over the years.

One of the sure signs that a man or woman in our program is on a good path is the emergence of a generous spirit. It is a major moment when someone goes from being the kind of person who can only see what they want and who they can use, to being able to see the value in another person and investing in it. That stimulates so many different gifts in the giver and opens new pathways for blessing. Generosity is a

tide that always returns but not before it touches people and places that may be invisible to us. Time and time again our graduates return with food and clothing for our shelter. They come back to testify and encourage those in chapel.

There are some things in society that seem to have massive amounts of money thrown at them and yet there is no enduring solution. The scripture would call that putting your money in a bag full of holes, a purse that wears out. God encourages us to put our treasure where it is immune to forces in the world. True love-born generosity, prompted by obedience and encouraged by hope, is tarnish proof. One of our chapel speakers walked out at the finish of the service on a cold fall evening and I noticed she was in her stocking feet. When I asked about her shoes she smiled and said they were happier on someone else's feet. The smile on her own face was all high-beams. I discovered later that one of our ladies slept in her dorm bed with those very shoes under her pillow. Don't you just know that gesture drove home the point of every word spoken in the service?

We are moving into a season of harvest, a season we always associate with abundance. Is there a gift you can simply-fold into someone's life? Let's look around with the eyes the Spirit has given to us to see where we might direct His treasure. Let's toss a blessing upon the tide of a life and celebrate where the obedient waves take it even if we never see the shore. Our little bit can become mighty in His hands. Some of the smallest gestures people made in my own life gave me the most encouragement. There are no small generousities given with great love.

Thank you for your loving partnership. It has been a sustaining blessing for this ministry. I am also asking you to consider deepening your investment in this particular ministry at this particular time of economic challenge. We will use your support in straightforward ways Christ would applaud.

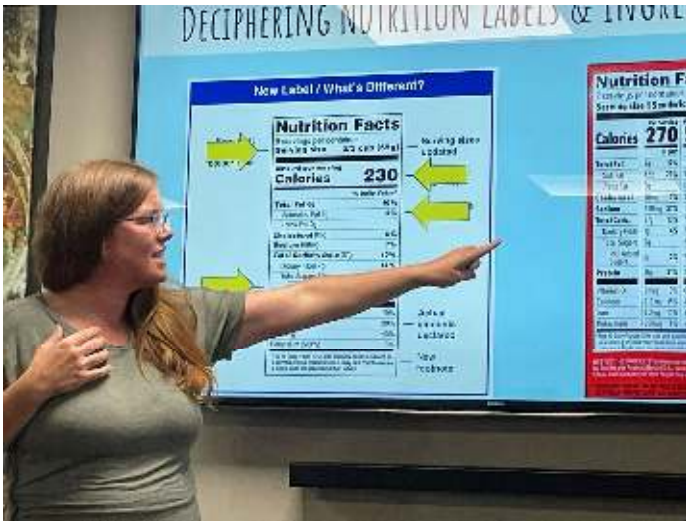

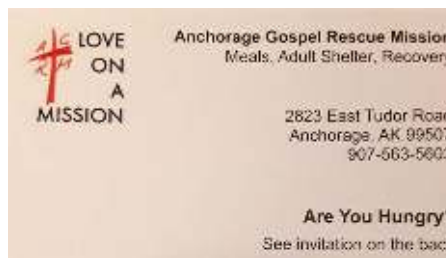
Steve is a Peach!

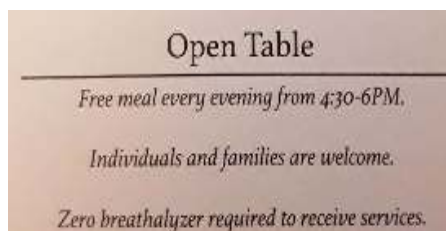
